Offensive Player of the Week



Harvard junior running back **GINO GORDON** (Bonita, Calif.) became the first player on record in school history to total 100 rushing and 100 receiving yards in a single game in the Crimson's 42-21 win over Dartmouth. Gordon tallied 222 yards and three touchdowns on just 12 touches, amassing all of his yardage in three quarters. He rushed for 119 yards on eight attempts (14.9 yards per carry) and had all three of his scores on the ground (eight, 15 and 48 yards) while not losing a yard from scrimmage. Gordon also caught four passes for 103 yards. In all, he averaged 18.3 yards per touch with 10 of his 12 touches resulting in either a first down or a touchdown.

Defensive Player of the Week



Yale junior defensive back **ADAM MONEY** (Whiteland, Ind.) made the key defensive plays in the Bulldogs' 23-22 come-from-behind win over Columbia. Money had a game-saving tackle late in the fourth quarter that stopped the Lions' **Leon Ivery** from scoring inside the five-yard line after a 75-yard gain. Yale forced and recovered a fumble on the very next play at the two-yard line to stop Columbia from what could have been the potential game-clinching touchdown. On the next Columbia series with just over two minutes remaining, he forced a fumble that he recovered at the Yale 49-yard line. Money's play set up the Elis' game-winning scoring drive with less than a minute left in the game. He finished the game with five tackles and added 148 all-purpose yards (99 kickoff return yards and 49 punt return yards) on his first day of return duties.

Special Teams Player of the Week



Brown sophomore punter **NATE LOVETT** (East Providence, R.I.) helped control the field position battle by punting eight times for an average of 44.2 yards per punt in the Bears' 14-7 overtime loss to Penn. Lovett booted a 72-yard punt, the seventh longest punt in Brown football history. Three times he pinned Penn inside its own 20-yard line, including one at the four-yard line.

Rookie of the Week



Harvard freshman running back **TREAVOR SCALES** (Stone Mountain, Ga.) collected a game-high 120 rushing yards with two touchdowns while finishing with 131 total yards of offense in the Crimson's win over Dartmouth. His first score came on a 40-yard scamper and he also bullied his way in from one yard out as he averaged 6.0 yards per carry without losing a yard from scrimmage.

Team-by-Team Notes

BROWN

Brown senior WR **Buddy Farnham** continues his assault on the Ivy League records book with his 207 career receptions ranking seventh all-time, his 2,636 receiving yards ranking ninth and his 4,392 career all-purpose yards also ranking ninth all-time entering the Bears' game against Yale. He currently ranks second in the nation in receiving yards with 106.29 yards per game, while his 52 receptions are ninth in the FCS. With 3.5 tackles for loss against Penn, senior DE **James Develin** enters the weekend ranked fifth in the nation with 1.71 tackles for loss per game.

COLUMBIA

Freshman QB **Sean Brackett** had his Columbia debut against Yale going 10-for-19 in the air for 180 yards and three touchdowns, while rushing for 68 yards on 15 carries. In his first collegiate start, junior RB **Leon Ivery** ran for 127 yards on 16 carries against the Bulldogs. Senior WR/RS **Austin Knowlin** needs just 32 yards to become the school's leader in receiving yards to pass the 2,384 yards by **Bill Reggio** (1981-83) entering the Lions' matchup with Harvard. Knowlin needs 210 all-purpose yards to break into the League's the top 10 all-time and pass Princeton's **Judd Garrett** (1987-89).

CORNELL

Senior RB **Randy Barbour** scored his 13th career rushing touchdown in Cornell's loss to Princeton. With 898 career punt return yards, senior WR/RS **Bryan Walters** needs just five yards to break the Ivy record of 902 yards held by Penn's **Mark Fabish**. Sophomore DE and first-year starter **Matt MacFarlane** had two tackles for loss against the Tigers, his second game this year with multiple TFLs. The linebacking duo of senior **Chris Costello** and junior **Brandon Lainhart** continued to excel, matching each other with 14 total stops and a tackle for loss against Princeton.

DARTMOUTH

Sophomore RB **Nick Schwieger**, who was the Ivy League and national FCS offensive player of the week last week, suffered a broken finger at Harvard and is expected to miss the rest of the season. Sophomore WR **Michael Reilly's** touchdown on a blocked Harvard punt was the first for Dartmouth in two years when the Big Green pulled it off against Yale. Freshman LB **Garrett Wymore** set a season high for the second straight week as he tied for the team lead with 12 tackles vs. the Crimson. Wymore earned the starting role four weeks ago and has 31 tackles in those four contests and a total of 35 stops for the season.

HARVARD

Junior RB **Gino Gordon** (8 rushes, 119 yards, 3 TDs) and freshman RB **Treavor Scales** (20 rushes, 120 yards, 2 TDs) became the first Harvard duo in 10 years to rush for at least 100 yards each in the Crimson's win over Dartmouth. Both players had their century marks before the end of the third quarter. The last time two backs collected 100 yards apiece for the Crimson came in 1999 when **Chris Menick** (22 rushes for 115) and **Chuck Nwokocho** (14 rushes for 110 yards) broke out against Cornell. In the past two games, Gordon, Scales and senior RB **Cheng Ho** have combined for 59 carries for 455 yards (7.7 yards per carry) and seven touchdowns while not losing a single yard from scrimmage.

PENN

Penn became the first program in NCAA history—at any level—to play in 1,300 games. The Quakers' overtime win at Brown was its sixth consecutive Ivy road win and ninth in a row in the month of October. Prior to this overtime win, Penn was 0-6 in games that have gone beyond regulation since 2006. Prior to that winless streak, the Quakers were 3-0 in overtime. Senior QB **Kyle Olson** had a career day in the win over the Bears with 313 yards on 27-of-47 passing.

PRINCETON

After the 17-13 win over Cornell, Princeton head coach **Roger Hughes** gave the game ball to **Jordan Culbreath**, the 2008 Ivy League rushing champion who was diagnosed with aplastic anemia at the beginning of the season. Junior WR **Trey Peacock** recorded his first multiple-touchdown game of his career with scoring receptions of 17 and 78 yards in Princeton's Halloween win over Cornell. His 78-yard catch was longest for the Tigers in five years. He ended the game with three catches for 113 yards and the two touchdowns.

YALE

Yale capitalized on turnovers in Columbia's final three drives of the game, plus a touchdown-saving tackle from junior DB **Adam Money**, to pull out the one-point victory over the Lions after trailing by 12 points with just over six minutes left. The Columbia-Yale game featured the first matchup between the Ivy League's first two black football head coaches -- Columbia's **Norries Wilson** and Yale's **Tom Williams**. The two coaches had never worked together nor coached against each other.

54TH SEASON OF IVY FOOTBALL

The 2009 season marks the 54th season of Ivy League Football. This season, 29 games involving Ivy teams will be broadcasted on television and/or national satellite radio, including four games on VERSUS and 13 games on SIRIUS Satellite Radio.

BROWN'S JASINOWSKI NAMED 2009 NATIONAL FOOTBALL FOUNDATION SCHOLAR-ATHLETE

Brown senior offensive tackle **Paul Jasinowski** was named a 2009 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete and one of the 16 finalists who will vie for the William V. Campbell Trophy, endowed by HealthSouth, that will be presented on December 8 at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City.

Jasinowski is the 47th Ivy player to be honored as a NFF Scholar-Athlete and the sixth in Brown history, following **Paul Choquette** (1959), **Travis Holcombe** (1981), **David Folsom** (1982), **John Cuozzo** (1987) and **Nick Hartigan** (2005).

Head coach **Phil Estes** said Paul "attacks everything he does with great passion, great focus and with lots of success. He's the complete student-athlete."

In the classroom, the Washington D.C. native is an Ivy League Honor Roll member with a 3.70 GPA. After graduating with a double major in Economics and Urban Studies, he plans to pursue an MBA. A two-time All-Ivy player, Jasinowski has anchored an offensive line that led the Ivy League in sacks given up (7) en route to Brown's Ivy League Championship. During his sophomore season, the Bears led the Ivy League in total offense and passing offense. As a junior, Jasinowski and the offensive line led the way to Brown's offense being ranked first in the Ivy in scoring at 29.3 points per game. This season, Brown leads the Ivy League in total offense and points per game as well as sacks against.

For three years, Jasinowski has been a coordinator and leader of a weekly volunteer group for special needs students at Fox Point Elementary School. In 2008, he was awarded the Chris Perry Community Service Award, given to a Brown football player who is the most involved in the community and exhibits the qualities of "scholarship, leadership and concern for others". He also co-coordinated a fundraiser event to benefit the fight against cancer called Bench Press for Cancer.

Each finalist receive an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship, and one of the 16 will be announced as the recipient of the 20th Anniversary William V. Campbell Trophy, endowed by HealthSouth (and formerly known as the Draddy Trophy), which recognizes an individual as the absolute best scholar-athlete in the nation. The award comes with a 25-pound bronze trophy and a \$25,000 post-graduate scholarship. A total distribution of \$300,000 in scholarships will be awarded.

Selected as the best and the brightest from the college gridiron, the 16 finalists were chosen from a nationwide pool of 154 semifinalists among all NCAA divisions and the NAIA which included Columbia senior strong safety **Andy Shalbrack**, Dartmouth senior quarterback **Alex Jenny** and Princeton senior defensive back **Dan Kopolovich**.

DRADDY AWARD RENAMED FOR COLUMBIA'S CAMPBELL

The National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame has renamed college football's premiere scholar-athlete award, the Vincent dePaul Draddy Trophy, in honor of **William V. Campbell**, the chairman of Intuit, former player and head coach at Columbia University and the 2004 recipient of the NFF's Gold Medal.

Known as "The Coach of Silicon Valley," Bill Campbell has become one the country's most influential business leaders, playing critical roles in the success of Apple, Google, Intuit and countless other high-tech companies. The captain of the 1961 Columbia Ivy League championship team, he found his true calling after an unlikely career change at age 39 from football coach to advertising executive.

On September 8, a group of the nation's top business leaders gathered at the Cantor Arts Center on the campus of Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif., to honor Campbell. NFF Board Member **Mike Moe**, who works closely with Campbell in the venture capital field, welcomed the a-list crowd of approximately 150 people, including Apple co-founder and CEO **Steve Jobs**, Google co-founder and president **Larry Page**, Google CEO **Eric Schmidt**, eBay CEO **John Donahoe**, Hewlett Packard EVP **Todd Bradley**, and **John Doerr**, one of the top partners at Kleiner Perkins Caufield & Byers.

IVY FOOTBALL IN THE NEWS

Ivy League Football has been in the headlines throughout the 2009 season with coverage from local, regional and national media outlets.

Bill Reynolds of the Providence Journal did an enlightening piece on Brown's **Neal Rooney**, who was having a budding college football career before a concussion cut it short.

Harvard offensive lineman **James Williams**, considered to be the nation's top FCS offensive lineman, and Brown defensive tackle **David Howard** have received much attention this season potential pro prospects for the 2010 NFL Draft. The two were featured by Bloomberg News' **Curtis Eichelberger** and VERSUS.com's **Craig Haley**.

Haley, who has been covering Ivy Football for 10 years, is tracking the League on a weekly basis with his column on **VERSUS.com**. He also wrote an article for the **Trenton Times** on Princeton senior running back **Jordan Culbreath**, who was diagnosed with aplastic anemia and bone marrow failure disease after suffering an ankle sprain in the second game of what was to be his final season to wear a Tiger uniform.

The *Los Angeles Times*' **David Wharton** featured former Harvard standout **Desmond Bryant**, who worked against the odds to make the 53-man roster of the Oakland Raiders. Another former Crimson standout, **Ryan Fitzpatrick**, was the subject of **Lee Roth**'s Rochester Democrat and Chronicle piece about the 2004 Ivy League Player of the Year taking over the signal-calling duties for the Buffalo Bills.

HARVARD'S LEWIS NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

A pioneer in athletics and politics, Harvard's **William Henry Lewis** was among the 16 players and two coaches named to the 2009 College Football Hall of Fame.

Lewis became the 108th Ivy Leaguer to be named to the hall of fame as a player to go along with the 29 Ivy coaches who have earned this prestigious honor.

A center at Harvard from 1892-93, Lewis was the first ever African-American to earn First Team All-America honors. He helped Harvard compile a daunting 22-2 record during his career with the Crimson. Lewis selected by the National Football Foundation's Football Bowl Subdivision Veterans Committee from the national ballot of 76 candidates and a pool of hundreds of eligible nominees.

The 2009 College Football Hall of Fame FBS Class will be inducted at the National Football Foundation Annual Awards Dinner on December 8 at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. They will be officially enshrined at the Hall in South Bend, Ind., during ceremonies in the summer of 2010.

BY THE NUMBERS

The 800-win club is an exclusive one in NCAA Division I Football. The exclusive club welcomed only its ninth member all-time in Harvard with its win over Lehigh. The Crimson earned its 800th win in program history in its 1,225th game.

Harvard joins Yale, making the Ivy League the home of two of the nine programs to reach the 800-win plateau. Yale leads all FCS programs in wins and is second only to Michigan. Penn will become third Ivy school all-time to reach the 800-win club. Penn will embark on another milestone on October 31 in its game at Brown. That game will be the Quakers' 1,300th in program history making Penn the first team in NCAA history to reach that number.

With 118 career wins, Bagnoli now holds sixth all-time and is only two wins behind **Tuss McLaughry** (Brown, 1926-40; Dartmouth, '41-42 & '45-54) for fifth place.

Recent grads **Desmond Bryant** [Harvard '09] and **Colin Cloherty** [Brown '09] earned spots joining a veteran group of former Ivy standouts who have earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl selections and Super Bowl titles. **Dennis Norman** [Princeton '01], who was released by the Jacksonville Jaguars just prior to the regular season after five years, was signed by the San Diego Chargers on September 16.

Missing from the list this year are **Casey Cramer** [Dartmouth '05], who was waived by the Tennessee Titans just prior to the season after spending the 2008 season with the Miami Dolphins and the 2006-07 seasons with the Titans; **Clifton Dawson** [Harvard '07], who played with the Indianapolis Colts during the 2007 and 2008 seasons and was released with an injury settlement by the Houston Texans entering the season; **Jonathan Dekker** [Princeton '06], who spent the 2006-07 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers; **Zak Keasey** [Princeton '05], who was released by the San Francisco 49ers with an injury settlement after breaking his forearm in a preseason game against Denver; and **Nate Lawrie** [Yale '04], who played in eight games for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2008.

Steve Cargile [Columbia '04], who spent the 2006-08 seasons with the Denver Broncos, was briefly with Tampa Bay Buccaneers during the 2009 preseason before being released. The Buccaneers re-signed Cargile and he played briefly in the team's week two game against Buffalo. He was released again after that game. **Paul Raymond** [Brown '08] spent time on the practice squads for the New York Jets, Detroit Lions and New York Giants and was most recently waived by the Cleveland Browns prior to this season. 2008 Ivy League Player of the Year **Chris Pizzotti** [Harvard '09] signed with the New York Jets as an undrafted free agent following the 2009 NFL Draft but was waived just prior to the start of the regular season.

BROWN'S DeOSSIE, MOREY NAMED TO 2009 PRO BOWL

Two Ivy League former standouts, Brown's **Zak DeOssie** and **Sean Morey**, earned selection to the 2009 Pro Bowl following the 2008-09 National Football League season. Morey, a member of the Super Bowl XLIII participant Arizona Cardinals, was named to his first Pro Bowl as the NFC's special teams starter in his eighth season. DeOssie, who won a Super Bowl ring in 2007 with Cornell's **Kevin Boothe** and Penn's **Jim Finn** as members of the New York Giants, was selected as a "need" player by Philadelphia Eagles head coach **Andy Reid**.

MOREY TO CHAIR NFLPA BRAIN INJURY COMMITTEE

Former Brown standout and current Arizona Cardinals wide receiver **Sean Morey** will chair the NFL Players Association's concussion and traumatic brain injury committee to address the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of concussions and brain injuries in active players and the long-term cumulative effects of isolated or repetitive traumatic brain injuries in NFL players as patients.

Morey will chair the committee with union medical director **Dr. Thom Mayer**. It will also be comprised of other active players, former players, researchers in the field and physicians with expertise in neurological injuries.

"The health, safety and welfare of our players is never just an issue of collective bargaining," NFLPA executive director **DeMaurice Smith** said October 2. "While we have already raised this issue in the CBA negotiations and Dr. Mayer participated in the first meeting, this committee and the work we do around the health and safety of our players will extend much further. The creation of this committee was designed to bring both independence and expertise to the ongoing analysis of serious head injuries so we can better protect our players. I am confident that **Sean Morey** and Dr. Mayer will lead this team to gather more comprehensive data and provide real solutions for our players, both past and present."

The 2009 season will be another assault on the Ivy football records as several categories feature active players looking to reach the highest marks in League lore. Cornell senior wide receiver **Bryan Walters**, the League's all-time leader in kickoff returns and kickoff return yards, is poised to be the all-time leader in punt returns and punt return yards and will make a run to finish his career in the top leaders in all-purpose yards. Brown senior wide receivers **Buddy Farnham** and **Bobby Sewall** are moving up the Ivy career charts in receptions and yards, as is Columbia wide receiver/return specialist **Austin Knowlin**, who cracked the career list in all-purpose yards this season joining Waters.

For the third time in four years, Harvard was selected the favorite in the annual Ivy League Football Preseason Media Poll to win the 2009 Ivy title. Harvard received 10 of the 17 first-place votes from the media panel, tallying 129 points. The Crimson enters the 2009 season looking to capture its third-straight Ivy crown to become the first team to three-peat since Dartmouth in 1990-92. **Tim Murphy's** Harvard squad earned a share of the 2008 championship, becoming just the eighth team in history to bounce back from a loss in its League opener and still win the Ivy title.

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA HONORS

The Ivy League was once again well-represented among the preseason national All-America accolades entering the 2009 season. A total of seven Ivies were named preseason first-, second- or third-team All-America, including multiple selections for Columbia senior wide receiver/return specialist **Austin Knowlin**, Penn junior kicker **Andrew Samson** and Harvard senior offensive tackle **James Williams**.

Knowlin totaled a team-best 1,072 all-purpose yards with six touchdowns in 2008. Williams was tabbed to *The Sports Network* preseason team for the second straight year, which has also given him season-end honors since 2007. Samson set a Penn single-season record with 16 field goals, which ranked him third in the nation, and also set school career mark hitting 49 PATs in a row, an active streak entering this season, during his first two years in a Quaker uniform.

Penn senior cornerback **Chris Wynn** was named one of the 20 players named to the preseason watch list for Buck Buchanan Award, presented by *The Sports Network* annually to the top FCS defensive player.

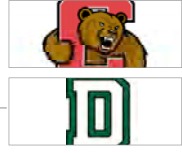
